From the Principal

Dear Parents

School activities

We continue to be guided by the NSW Health Department and Catholic Education Office Diocese of Parramatta regarding activities at the school and update you on the following school events in Term 4:

- **Kindergarten 2021 Orientation**—We are looking at our Parent Information Evening on Monday 2 November being held via a Zoom meeting. At this stage we are still uncertain as to how we will manage Kindergarten 2021 orientation. More information will be provided to our families as soon as possible.
- **Year** 6 **Graduation**—We are still exploring our options. Once we are clear about the possibilities of what it will look like we will be sending information out to our families.

Early Life Foundations

An *Early Life Foundations Zoom Parent Information* session was held for our Kindergarten parents on Tuesday night. Thank you to the parents who were able to take part in this meeting. This was an opportunity to explain to our parents the importance of investigative play that takes place in Kindergarten four days per week.

The presenter, Melinda Vander Reest, spoke about the importance of children having positive relationships with not only their peers, but also with the adults working with them and how this is enhanced during investigative play. Some of the many positive benefits for the children from their involvement in investigative play were: development of literacy and numeracy, communication skills, risk taking, respectful interactions, confidence building, self regulation, creativity, problem solving, life skills, resilience, collaboration, improved curriculum outcomes. The Kindergarten team can see from just the first few weeks, the increased learning and engagement of the students.

Fathers' Day—Sunday 6 September

"Happy Fathers' Day" to our fathers. But what is Fathers' Day? According to one astute 8 year-old, "It's a bit like Mothers' Day, only it doesn't cost as much!" A more advanced concept of Fathers' Day would be that this special day is an opportunity to celebrate the important role that fathers play in the lives of their children; a role that cannot be played by any other person.

Studies have show that when fathers are affectionate and helpful, their children are more likely to get on well with each other. When children have fathers who are emotionally involved, so that they acknowledge their children's emotions and help them deal with bad emotions, they tend to have better relationships with children outside of their family and behave less aggressively. (Gottman, Katz & Hooven. How Families Communicate Emotionally)

Fathers with a strong commitment to their family provide a model of responsible behaviour for their children. As a consequence, their children tend to take more responsibility for their actions and rarely blame others for their mistakes. Fathers also influence their children's moral development by being good models for their children to admire and desire to resemble. This results in their children developing a strong respect for rules and authority figures. (M.L. Hoffman, *The Role of the Father in Moral Internalisation*)

There is no doubt that every child has a longing to be held and loved by a father-figure and to be mentored through to their adult life by a father who is there for them.

COVID-19

Children who are unwell (even if they have the mildest flu-like symptoms) should NOT be attending school.

In accordance with advice from NSW Health, if your child attends school and becomes ill or presents with flu-like symptoms we will request that you collect them from the school office. Students should not return to school until they are no longer ill or displaying any flu-like symptoms.

NSW Health have also requested that anyone who is unwell or has even mild flu-like symptoms (see NSW Health, "What are the symptoms"), should be tested through their local medical practitioner or one of the COVID-19 clinics. More information can be found at NSW Health.

Any students with flu-like symptoms will need to provide a copy of a negative COVID-19 test result before being permitted to return to school. This is generally in the form of a text message which you can take a screenshot of and email through to stmichaelsbhills@parra.catholic.edu.au

Please keep your child home if they are unwell.

"What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

- fever (37.5° or higher)
- cough
- sore throat
- shortness of breath (difficulty breathing)
- loss of taste
- loss of smell.

Other reported symptoms of COVID-19 include fatigue, runny nose, muscle pain, joint pain, headache, diarrhoea, nausea/vomiting and loss of appetite.

You only need one symptom to get tested, and it can be mild. If you have a symptom, don't delay, please get tested and self-isolate straight away."

Koalas have very sharp claws to help them climb trees and to reach the eucalyptus leaves. Lachlan and Luca


The Arctic Fox has thick, white fur which helps it survive in the very cold conditions. Its fur can change colour with the seasons. *Michael and Chris T*










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
