Happy Easter!

There are a few days to go before we enter into the joys of "chocolate land!" Of course, one important thing to do before we loosen our belts on Easter Sunday, is to have a bit of a rethink about what actually happened on the first Easter day.

No doubt, if we had been alive in Jesus' time we, too, would have been astonished by the miracle of a resurrected corpse.

"Jesus has not returned to a normal human life in this world like Lazarus and the others whom Jesus raised from the dead. He has entered upon a different life, he has entered the vast breadth of God himself, and it is from there that he reveals himself to his followers'."

"In Jesus' Resurrection, a new possibility of human existence is attained that affects everyone and that opens up a future, a new kind of future, for mankind."

Now, what would you have been thinking if you were one of Jesus' followers on that first Easter day?

"... they were simply overwhelmed by the reality, but after their initial hesitation and astonishment, they could no longer ignore that reality. It is truly he. He is alive; he has spoken to us; he has allowed us to touch him, even if he no longer belongs to the tangible in the normal way."

Jesus' disciples were quite used to Jesus performing the unusual: restoring sight to the blind; restoring mobility to the crippled; curing lepers of their disease. But now they had to grapple with a new understanding of Jesus: "He was quite different, no mere resurrected corpse but one living anew and forever in the power of God. And yet, at the same time, no longer belonging to our world, he was truly present there, he himself. It was an utterly unique experience, which burst upon the normal boundaries of experience and yet for the disciples was quite beyond doubt."

So, when Easter Sunday does arrive we can join with the writer of Psalm 117 in saying, "*This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.*" We can rejoice and be glad, because Jesus, through his humanity, has given us the opportunity of true resurrection. However, as the resurrected Jesus said to the once doubting Thomas, "*You believe in me Thomas, because you have seen me; happy are those who have not seen me, but still believe.*" (John 20:29) That's us.

Happy Easter-enjoy those chocolate eggs!

Religious Education

We Have The Most Wonderful Saviour!

This week we consider a key aspect of Jesus' identity, that of Saviour. Two thousand plus years ago, on what we now know as 'Palm Sunday', the streets were lined with people crying out 'Hosanna' (Lord, save us) as Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey. The people of the time lived under harsh Roman rulership, not free to live as they chose, or say what they liked. They longed for deliverance, freedom, and a new kingdom. They longed for a saviour. Jesus was the hero for the people. They cheered, bowed, and spread their coats and palm branches before him as he passed by.

As we imagine the crowd, the unified cry of 'Hosanna', we try to imagine their need of desperation and simultaneous hope. It was the realisation of the people that they could not save themselves, and that they needed to connect to security and cry out to their saviour. In its purest form, it is worship, coming to the end of oneself, and seeking God to intervene. Certainly, it looked and sounded like worship.

'Hosanna! He who comes in the name of the Lord is the blessed One! ...Hosanna in the highest heaven!" (Mark 11: 9-10). The cry of Hosanna is just as relevant today in our world, and for us, as it was then. Jesus' power and authority are just as strong and as relevant as it was then.

During Holy Week you are invited to remember, 'Hosanna'. 'It was indeed a very Good Friday when the King of Kings gave his life for our salvation. What a magnificent God. What an outrageous gift.

Hosanna! Blessed be the name of the Lord.

An Easter 2021 Message from Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv, Bishop of Parramatta

"Go and tell my brothers and I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God".

My dear friends,

At Easter, we hear these words of the Risen Lord who empowers Mary of Magdala to overcome fear and to proclaim the Good News to others. She is known as an apostle to the apostles.

But it was not just Mary of Magdala who had a pivotal role in the early days of Christianity. Throughout salvation history, women disciples have played a critical part in forging a new future out of the hopeless present. Puah and Shiprah acted as catalysts for the exodus by their civil disobedience.

Esther boldly intervened for her people at the foreign court. Ruth broke new ground of inclusion as a consummate outsider. Mary MacKillop, of course, started a new and hitherto unheralded group of women who took the Good News to the edges of Australian society.

If the Church is to be faithful to the biblical narrative and responsive to the living presence of God, it must reclaim a discipleship of equals and empower men and women disciples to share their gifts for human flourishing and the growth of the Kingdom.

At the heart of the Easter message is the summons to a new future, framed with hope and possibility, in the midst of entrenched hopelessness. As with Mary and the disciples, who were emboldened to move from the shadows of crucifixion into the light and life of the Risen Christ, the Church must live this message.

It must embody the alternative relational paradigm that is rooted in the radical inclusivity, mutuality, compassion and the powerlessness of Jesus. We cannot have a better future if we persist in the age-old but dying paradigm of triumphalism, elitism, male supremacy and clerical dominance.

The Gospel speaks of the bewilderment and disillusionment of the disciples as they were confronted with an empty tomb. Perhaps, their experience was not unique. Many also go searching for Jesus in the Church and instead find it empty and void of what they thirst for.

It is incumbent on us especially as leaders to make the Church into a place where people can meet and experience the Risen Lord. We must not remain a closed system. For we encounter the living Christ beyond the known boundaries of our worldview. We meet him as a community of seekers of truth, meaning and ultimate concern. More importantly, we witness to him in our acts of solidarity, communion and service to the common good.

This transition time calls us to grieve before we can emerge cleansed, renewed and transformed. Mary wept at the sight of the empty tomb. We too must grieve for those whose experience has been one of exclusion, instead of an encounter of radical love, inclusiveness, and solidarity.

Pope Francis recently called on the Christian communities to sow seeds of love instead of issuing theoretical condemnations.

In the spirit of conversion, the Church here in Parramatta has embarked upon a Review of Governance with a view to improving governance practices and implementing key principles for a more synodal and "bottom-up" ecclesiology. The time has come for us not only to admit the need for change but to discern together as to what the process and the agenda for change should look like going forward.

Brothers and sisters,

In the face of painful transition, let us be empowered by the presence of the Risen Lord, calling us beyond the fear of the unknown. The paschal rhythm summons us to a discipleship of humility, weakness and vulnerability, of dying and rising in Christ.

We must die to the old ways of being Church abandoning the old paradigm of a fortress Church, prone to exclusivity and elitism. Instead, we learn to rise to Christlike ways of humility, inclusiveness, compassion.

May we be strengthened to walk the journey of faith and we may be leaven to the Kingdom through our active discipleship, witness, and engagement in the world. Let us have the courage of Mary and be truly Easter men and women bringing to life the Good News in our Church and our world.

Year 4AF—Mrs Amanda Feíl

Year 4 has recently been doing 'Array Busting' for math warm-ups.

So ... what exactly is array busting?

Firstly, arrays are a visual tool that helps to build an understanding of multiplication and division. Breaking apart arrays is an effective strategy for students who are learning multiplication as it helps to model distributive property. For example: students usually learn their twos and their fives sooner than the larger times tables, so when faced with a problem like 6 X 7, students can instead look at the 7 as a (5+2) instead. Like this: $6 \times (5+2) \text{ OR } (6 \times 2) + (6 \times 5) = 12 + 30 = 42$.

Students begin by rolling two dice, (a 6 sided and a 12+ sided), to create their array. For example, if a 4 and a 12 is rolled the student might draw an array that looks like this:

When 'busting' this array, a student might split it into 2 (or more) smaller arrays as shown below. Then will then come up with multiple number sentences to express the array.



$4 \times 12 = (4 \times 2) + (4 \times 10)$

Students will then come up with as many ways to 'bust' the array as possible.

E.g. $4 \times 12 = (4 \times 4) + (4 \times 4) + (4 \times 4)$, etc.

Look at the fabulous examples below of 4AF students busting their own arrays! (Pictures are captioned by 4AF students Koby and Olivia).



Niamh is array busting neatly, using a lot of solutions. Her solutions include both multiplication and division.

Ivy is busting her 17 x 6 and 3 x 4 arrays better than Albert Einstein! She is doing it neatly and clearly so that she demonstrates her understanding clearly.



Olivia is doing her array busting very neatly and is finding a lot of different solutions. She is trying to bust her array using multiple and accurate solutions which involve both multiplication and division.

Michael can be seen here too, working hard on his own arrays!



Scarlett is working very hard in her array busting! The arrays she is busting are 5x7 and 3x2. She is showing many solutions and answers for her working out.



Luke is solving his arrays like a champion, using a ruler, writing clearly and using multiple solutions! The arrays he was solving were 9x10 and 6x2.
